Dear Agency Contact,

The Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT&PF), in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), is proposing to rehabilitate the Marshall runway, taxiway, apron, airport access road, and the snow removal equipment building, replace airport lighting and segmented circle and apply dust palliative. This project would provide the community with adequate access support the community and conform to current FAA safety standards. The Marshall Airport is located 2 miles Southeast of Marshall, Alaska. Marshall is located on the bank of the Poltes Slough of the Yukon River.

DOT&PF is requesting scoping comments to support preparation of an environmental document for the proposed project in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended (NEPA). Please identify any environmental, cultural, historic, or subsistence resources you believe may potentially be impacted by the proposed project, and also provide any other information you deem valuable to the environmental documentation process. Your responses will help provide us with the necessary input to develop and design a proposed final project that avoids and minimizes as many potential adverse environmental and human impacts as possible.

### **Purpose and Need**

The purpose of the proposed action is to rehabilitate the Marshall runway to meet FAA standards and reestablish safe and efficient surfacing for aviation operations. The Marshall Airport lighting system is beyond its useful life and is requiring increasing levels of maintenance. Minimal surfacing remains, exposing the subbase and increasing safety concerns. Shoulders have significant slope failure which is impacting the runway safety area and airport lighting. Additionally, shoulders are cracking and settling requiring rehabilitation. The existing SREB does not meet current building codes for the fuel storage, has a gravel floor, and other components require increasing levels of maintenance. Upgrading the fuel tanks to current standards and installing a concrete floor reduces contamination potential. Upgrading electrical, heating and repainting siding extends the useful life and reduces maintenance costs. The overall need for

the proposed action is to maintain the existing level of safe, reliable year-round air access to the community of Marshall.

### **Proposed Action**

DOT&PF are proposing the following improvements:

- Rehabilitate the airport access road and replace culverts.
- Resurface runway, taxiway, apron, SREB pad, and segmented circle pad.
- Reconstruct failing embankment shoulders and flatten slopes. Re-establish as-built drainage and re-grade ditch on the south side of the runway.
- Replace FAA runway end identifier lights (REILs).
- Rehabilitate the SREB.
- Replace airport lighting and segmented circle.
- Develop a new material site on Pilcher Mountain along the existing road.

Project work limits consists of the disturbed footprint of the runway, taxiway, apron, service road and embankments. There may be a limited amount of work beyond the existing embankments. It is anticipated existing local material site along airport access road may be used for material and contractor staging area. A new material site may be developed along an existing road. Minor road improvements may be required for haul traffic. Environmental preliminary research and review of project area resources has been conducted and is summarized in the attached Appendix A for your review and consideration.

### **Existing Site Conditions or Facilities**

Marshall Airport is the only existing airport in the village. They rely heavily on the airport for supplies and medical assistance. The original runway was constructed in 2003 and is in major need of rehabilitation.

### **Preliminary Environmental Research**

The proposed project is not expected to involve any significant environmental impacts and a Categorical Exclusion document will be prepared (23 CFR 771.117).



### Preliminary Review of Project Study Area Resources Marshall Airport Improvements

### **Air Quality**

A review of the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC) *Air Non-Point Mobile Source* website (ADEC, 2022a) indicated the proposed project is not in an air quality maintenance or non-attainment area for National Ambient Air Quality Standards. However, Marshall is a community with reported dust complaints. Dust during construction would be regulated using Best Management Practices (BMPs) and compliance with the Alaska Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Construction General Permit; therefore, no adverse air quality impacts associated with the proposed project are anticipated.

# Biological Resources (Fish, Wildlife, & Plants) *Fish*

A review of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) Fish Resource Monitor (ADF&G, 2022) and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Essential Fish Habitat (EFH) mapper (NOAA, 2022) did identify anadromous waters within the project area. The town of Marshall is located on the banks of the Poltes Slough of the Yukon River, an anadromous stream (334-20-11000-2375). Chum salmon, coho salmon, king salmon are present and pink salmon, sockeye salmon, arctic char, arctic lamprey, inconnu, and whitefish are present at the mouth of the river. The Bering Sea is EFH for chum, pink, coho, sockeye, and chinook salmon, and is that is where the Yukon River eventually flows into.

### Wildlife

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) *Information for Planning and Consultation* (IPaC; USFWS, 2022) lists there is only one threatened species, the Wood Bison (*Bison bison athabascae*). There are no migratory birds or refuge lands in or adjacent to the project location. Consultation will be made with the USFWS as the design moves forward. There are not expected to be any adverse impacts to the Wood bison as a result of this project.

### Plants

The Alaska Exotic Plants Information Clearinghouse (AKEPIC, 2022) was reviewed and the database mapper indicated that no non-native plants have been recorded in the project area. The project is anticipated to involve vegetation loss associated with construction. DOT&PF would comply with Executive Order 13112 (Invasive Species) by; 1) ensuring that ground disturbing activities are minimized, and disturbed areas are re-vegetated with seed recommended for the region by Alaska Department of Natural Resources (ADNR)'s *A Revegetation Manual for Alaska*; 2) construction equipment would be inspected and cleaned prior to enter and exiting the construction site to minimize spread of vegetative materials; and 3) erosion and sediment control materials would be locally produced products to minimize potential importation of new propagules from outside Alaska.

### Climate

FAA Order 1050.1F, Change 1, Guidance Memo #3, Considering GHGs and Climate under the NEPA: Interim Guidance, includes guidance for evaluating greenhouse gas emissions with proposed projects under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The guidance states GHG emissions resulting from the proposed action should be evaluated qualitatively or quantitatively. There is no GHG emission data available for Marshall. GHG emissions are

expected to be minimal and short-term during construction. The proposed project would not permanently increase aviation traffic; therefore, no net change in GHGs are anticipated.

### **Coastal Resources**

The Alaska Coastal Management Program expired on June 11, 2011 and is no longer in effect.

### **Department of Transportation Act, Section 4(f)**

The National Parks Service (2022) and U.S. Forest Service (2022) websites were reviewed for publicly owned lands including public parks, recreation area, wildlife or waterfowl refuges of national, state, or local significance, or land from a historic site of national, state, or local significance within the project area. Marshall lies within the boundaries of Yukon Delta National Wildlife Refuge. This 4(f) property will be consulted and go through the 4(f) process as the project moves forward.

### **Farmlands**

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) (USDA, 2022), there are no designated soils of local importance, nor prime or unique farmland within the project area.

### Hazardous Materials, Solid Waste, and Pollution Prevention

A search of ADEC's Contaminated Sites Program database identified only four contaminated sites near the project area. This first site, Hazard ID 1040, the Marshall Maserculiq/City Tank Farm is still an active site and has not been closed. A site characterization report was approved on 11/25/2019. This was the last activity reported at this site. The second site is Hazard ID 25798, Marshall Former School Days Tanks and Tank Farm. This site has a status of cleanup complete with no institutional controls. The third site is Hazard ID 3353, Marshall Hunter Store. This site is still active, billing has been suspended until updated contact information for the RP can be identified. The last site is Hazard ID 3354, the Marshall Fish Processing Plant. This site is also active, requesting a work plan in 2018. No excavation will be done in or near any of the sites. Consultation with ADEC will be conducted as the project moves on.

### Historical, Architectural, Archeological and Cultural Resources

A search of the Alaska Heritage Resources Survey (ARHS) Database (2022) showed three cultural resource sites in the surrounding Marshall area. Consultation will be conducted with SHPO to make sure there are no other cultural resources. The first site, RUS-00037, consists of the remains of a WWII radio tower station on the summit of Pilcher Mountain. Most of the portable materials have been removed on the site and it has been determined not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places due to lack of integrity. The second site, MAR-00010, St Michael Chapel, is located in the village itself, adjacent, but not in the project boundaries. The determination of eligibility has not been made at this point in time. The third site, MAR-00006, Marshall, shows the remains of the time period that Marshall was a gold camp. There were underground tunnels that served to transport alcohol from the river. This site does not have determination of eligibility and there are not anticipated impacts that will be made to this archeological site.

### **Land Use**

DOT&PF manages the airport property where the project area is located. The proposed project would not be inconsistent with airport property use.

### **Natural Resources and Energy Supply**

Water, sewer, electricity, telephone, and solid waste disposal utilities are provided at the Marshall Airport. The proposed action would not change the energy requirements for the airport.

### Noise and Noise-Compatible Land Use

Per the 1050.1F Desk Reference (FAA, 2015), a noise analysis is required if annual operations exceed 90,000 propeller operations or 700 jet operations. The proposed project would not increase operations to exceed those figures; therefore, a noise analysis would not be required.

### **Water Resources**

### Wetlands

Wetland mapping and functional assessment has not been completed for the Marshall Airport though imagery and site visit indicates that the airport is surrounded by wetlands. Wetlands will be impacted during construction and a permit and consultation will be conducted with the Army Corps of Engineers.

### **Floodplains**

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA, 2010) does not have published maps for the Marshall Airport.

### Surface Waters

The Marshall Airport is located 2 miles southeast of Marshall, Alaska, which is on the bank of the Poltes Slough of the Yukon River. The Yukon River is a navigable river under the Army Corps of Engineers. No impaired waterbodies on the ADEC 303(d) List of Impaired Waterbodies are located within Marshall or the project area. Drainage patterns at the airport would not be altered as part of the proposed project.

### Wild and Scenic Rivers

The Yukon River is not considered Wild and Scenic Rivers (National Park Service, 2022b). There will be no impacts to the rivers themselves. There should not be any adverse impacts to this area.

Hello,

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has no record of nearby contamination for this project, however at some airports there may be past or present use of aqueous firefighting foams (AFFF) for training activities and for fuel fire suppression. Use of AFFF can result in PFAS contamination of soil, surface water, groundwater, and can also be found in asphalt. While not all these areas have been evaluated for PFAS contamination, ADEC and ADOT&PF are working to evaluate current and former Part 139 airports and former defense sites owned by ADOT&PF for PFAS. Please contact Sammy Cummings, PFAS Program Manager — ADOT&PF Statewide Aviation (907) 888-5671 or <a href="mailto:sammy.cummings@alaska.gov">sammy.cummings@alaska.gov</a>, to determine if there have been releases of AFFF at this airport or former defense site prior to conducting work. If PFAS is a potential concern, work needs to be coordinated with ADEC Contaminated Sites Program and ADOT&PF Statewide Aviation.

There is also concern at SREB buildings on site. Equipment storage and maintenance buildings may have gravel floors where oil and other hazardous substances have been spilled over the years. DEC recommends characterizing gravel floors prior to conducting work in this area as the soil on the SREB floor is almost always contaminated and requires special handling and disposal.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed project. The following comments are limited to Air Quality (AQ). Other divisions within ADEC will need to respond within their areas of expertise.

ADEC agrees with DOT&PF that the proposed project is not located in a non-attainment or maintenance area for air quality control under the Clean Air Act. Therefore, it does not require an applicability analysis under the General Conformity regulations.

However, if open burning is chosen as the preferred method of disposal of organic debris, DOT&PF or their contractor must use "reasonable procedures to minimize adverse environmental effects and limit the amount of smoke generated," as well as get any applicable permits. The Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT&PF), in cooperation with the Alaska Region, Airports Division of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), is proposing to make improvements to the Don Hunter Sr. Airport, in Marshall Alaska. The DOT&PF on behalf of FAA finds that no historic properties would be affected by the proposed project pursuant to 36 CFR§800.4(d)(1), implementing regulations of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. This submission provides documentation in support of this finding, as required at 36 CFR§800.11(d).

### **Project Description**

The proposed project would include the following (see Figures 1-3):

1. Rehabilitate and widen the airport access road. The existing 14-foot-wide road would be widened to 18-feet-wide. Existing culverts would be replaced (in the same location and at the same depth) to accommodate the wider roadway (see Figure 2, culvert locations are in blue).

- 2. Rehabilitate the existing runway, taxiway, apron, SREB pad, and segmented circle pad (in the same location and at the same depth) (see Figure 3).

- 3. Reconstruct failing embankment shoulders and flatten slopes. Re-establish as-built drainage and re-grade ditch on the south side of the runway (see Figure 3).
- 4. Replace FAA runway end identifier lights (REILs) (in the same locations and at the same depth) (see Figure 3).
- 5. Rehabilitate the existing SREB (see Figure 3 in green).
- 6. Replace airport lighting (at the same depth and the same location) (see Figure 3).

DOT&PF originally proposed to obtain materials from existing Material Site C and develop Material Sites A and B (including the associated access road) as part of this project. That portion of the project has been dropped, and is being handled by Calista Corporation as a separate project. All materials for this project are anticipated to be contactor furnished. All required clearances and permits for material sites will be secured by the contractor and Calista Corporation prior to construction.

**Staging:** Contractor staging for the project is proposed in two locations. Staging for the Airport Access Road portion of the project is shown on Figure 2. Staging for the main airport work area will be limited to the previously disturbed portions of the project APE (see Figure 3 in red).

### **Area of Potential Effect (APE)**

The APE, which is outlined in red (see Figures 1-3), includes the main work area at the Don Hunter Sr. Airport, the right-of-way (ROW) boundary of the Airport Access Road, and all staging areas. The APE is reduced in size as proposed in the consultation initiation as the development of Material Sites A and B and the associated Pilcher Mountain Access Road have been removed from the project description. Potential visual effects were taken into consideration when establishing the APE.

### **Identification Efforts**

A search of the Alaska Heritage Resources Survey-IBS (AHRS) database on December 2, 2022 indicated that there are no (0) AHRS sites found within the project APE.

A search of the Alaska Department of Natural Resources Division of Mining, Lands and Water Revised Statute (RS) 2477 database of public rights-of-way indicates that one (1) RS 2477 trail intersects the project APE (RST-168). A description of the RS-2477 trail is provided below.

RST-168 Paimiut-Marshall Trail- This RS-2477 trail begins on the northern bank of the Yukon River near Paimiut Hills. The trail follows to the west along the northern bank of the Yukon River until it reaches Russian Mission. The trail continues overland until it reaches the banks of the Yukon River again in Marshall Alaska. This trail is not visible on satellite imagery, suggesting it is a winter trail. The AHRS database shows this linear feature crossing the project APE at the Marshall Airport access road. The APE in this area is limited to the ROW boundary of the road,

which has already been disturbed by the construction of the road. Given that the length of the trail is approximately 75 miles long and the segment that passes through the Project APE is relatively small (100 feet), evaluation of the trail as a whole for National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligibility is beyond the scope and scale of this project. For these reasons, no AHRS number has been assigned to the trail. As there is no physical evidence of the trail within the project APE, the trail does not reach the threshold for the application of the Criteria of Evaluation for the NRHP (36CFR§60.4). Therefore, no potential effect to the trail needs to be assessed.

A review of the DOT&PF Northern Region Cultural Resources Library revealed that the APE has been previously surveyed for cultural resources (Hanson 1997). No cultural resources were found as a result of that survey. The DOT&PF Archaeologist-Cultural Resources Specialist (PQI) believes that this level of identification is sufficient for this project.

### **Finding of Effect**

As there are no historic properties identified within the project APE, the DOT&PF Northern Region PQI seeks the Alaska State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) concurrence with a **no historic properties affected** finding for the project as presented.

### **Consulting Parties**

The DOT&PF, on behalf of FAA sent the following potential interested parties consultation initiation letters regarding this project: the Alaska State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO); Calista Corporation; Maserculiq, Incorporated; City of Marshall; and the Native Village of Marshall.

The DOT&PF received a response from the SHPO office indicating that they had no objection to the proposed APE or the level of identification effort. The DOT&PF also received a response from Calista Corporation noting that there are three AHRS sites near the project area. They indicated that they were in support of the project as long as DOT&PF does not directly or indirectly impact those AHRS sites. As project activities near those AHRS sites have been dropped from the project description, those sites will not be impacted by the proposed project. No other consultation initiation responses were received.





The National Marine Fisheries Service has reviewed the draft Environmental Assessment provided on June 6, 2023, regarding the Marshall Airport Improvements project. The purpose of this project is to improve the Marshall Don Hunter Sr. Airport in Marshall, Alaska to provide the community with adequate access for goods, services and passenger transport.

### **Essential Fish Habitat**

The North Pacific Fishery Management Council has designated EFH for Pacific salmon to include freshwater habitat used to complete their life cycle (NPFMC 2021). The Alaska Department of Fish and Game's <u>Anadromous Waters Catalog</u> identifies the Yukon River as supporting anadromous fish, including chum, coho, and king salmon within the waters adjacent to Marshall (Giefer and Graziano 2022). The presence of Pacific salmon in the waters adjacent to the project area is noted in your draft Environmental Assessment.

### Assessment of Effects to EFH

Your agency has concluded that the proposed project activity would not adversely affect EFH in the project area. The EFH regulations define an adverse effect as "any impact which reduces the quality and/or quantity of EFH" (50 CFR 600.810(a)). Based on our review of the project plans and the information provided, we agree with your conclusion of effects. Because the proposed project would not include in-water work in anadromous waters and drainage patterns at the airport would not be altered as part of the proposed project, we have no conservation recommendations for the proposed action and additional EFH consultation is not necessary.

Significant changes to the project may require reinitiating a consultation. If project plans change, due to the proximity of the project to Poltes Slough and the Yukon River, consider including long-term planning to support the resiliencies of species and ecosystems to climate change. Future project plans can include climate projections and assessments of effects to habitats and species in the project area to ensure the sustainability of healthy ecosystems, which increases resilience of coastal ecosystems, communities, and economies.

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) has no record of nearby contamination for this project, however at some airports there may be past or present use of aqueous firefighting foams (AFFF) for training activities and for fuel fire suppression. Use of AFFF can result in PFAS contamination of soil, surface water, groundwater, and can also be found in asphalt. While not all these areas have been evaluated for PFAS contamination, ADEC and ADOT&PF are working to evaluate current and former Part 139 airports and former defense sites owned by ADOT&PF for PFAS. Please contact Sammy Cummings, PFAS Program Manager — ADOT&PF Statewide Aviation (907) 888-5671 or sammy.cummings@alaska.gov, to determine if there have been releases of AFFF at this airport or former defense site prior to conducting work. If PFAS is a potential concern, work needs to be coordinated with ADEC Contaminated Sites Program and ADOT&PF Statewide Aviation.

There is also concern at SREB buildings on site. Equipment storage and maintenance buildings may have gravel floors where oil and other hazardous substances have been spilled over the years. DEC recommends characterizing gravel floors prior to conducting work in this area as the soil on the SREB floor is almost always contaminated and requires special handling and disposal.

### I. Proposed Project Description

The Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT&PF), in cooperation with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), proposes to make improvements to the Don Hunter Sr. Airport, in Marshall Alaska.

The existing airport and community are located at 61.636378° North Latitude and -162.037560° West Longitude; Sections 13,26,36, Township 21 North, Range 70 West and Section 18, Township 21 North Range 69 West; Seward Meridian; United States Geological Survey Quadrangle Marshall D-1, Alaska (Figure 1).

The Marshall Airport Improvements project includes the following elements (Figures 2-3):

- o Rehabilitate the existing runway, taxiway, and apron.
- o Reconstruct failing embankment shoulders and flatten slopes. Re-establish as-built drainage and re-grade ditch on the south side of the runway.
- o Rehabilitate and widen the airport access road. The existing road varies from 14-foot to 18-feet wide and will be widened to a consistent 18 feet wide.
- o Replace existing culverts along the airport access road in approximately the same location and depth. (Figure 2, culvert locations are in blue).
- o Replace FAA runway end identifier lights (REILs) (in the same locations.)
- o Replace airport lighting, segmented circle, and navigational aids.
- o Rehabilitate the existing SREB and pad.

Project work limits consists of the disturbed footprint of the runway, taxiway, apron, access road and embankments. There may be limited amount of work beyond the existing embankments.

### Material Sites and Construction

Materials and staging areas for this project are anticipated to be contractor furnished. All required clearances and permits for material sites will be secured before construction begins.

### **Estimated Project Duration**

The proposed project will take place between summer 2023 and fall 2024.

### II. Description of Proposed Project Area Section 4(f) Resources and Potential Impacts

a. Publicly owned Parks and Recreation Areas of National, State or Local Significance Open to the Public

### - Yukon Delta National Wildlife Refuge

It is the second-largest National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) in the country, U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt first set aside southwestern Alaska refuge lands in 1909. Other lands were added through the years until December 2, 1980, when President Jimmy Carter signed the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act (ANILCA) into law, which created the Yukon Delta NWR by consolidating existing refuges and adding additional lands. The large islands Nelson and Nunivak are also located within the refuge. It is home to about 35 villages and 25,000 people, many of Yup'ik Eskimo origin and dependent on a subsistence lifestyle.

The refuge's region bordering the Bering Sea is a rich, productive coastal wildlife habitat supporting one of the largest concentrations of water fowl in the world. This national wildlife refuge is home to mammalian species Alaska's Yukon Delta NWR is vast and productive. The refuge nestles between Alaska's largest rivers, the Yukon and the Kuskokwim Rivers, where the tundra meets the Bering Sea. Its diversity of habitats support one of the largest aggregations of water birds in the world. The hundreds of miles of rivers and streams provide critical spawning and rearing habitat for Pacific salmon species. Drier upland habitats harbor populations of brown and black bears, caribou, moose, wolves, and muskox. Along the coast, the Bering Sea waters host various marine mammals, including whales that pass during migration. This area and the refuge provides residents with the opportunity to maintain a subsistence way of life as an integral part of a dynamic ecosystem while also providing all people with the chance to enjoy a variety of recreational activities - boating, sport fishing, hiking, winter travel - in true wilderness. As a significant, and publicly owned and publicly available park component, the Yukon Delta NWR, qualifies as a Section 4(f) property.

### III. Agency Coordination and Section 106 Consultation

- Initiation letters were sent out on June 30, 2022 to SHPO and all interested parties. There were
  no objections to the proposed project received. Parties consulted included: The Alaska SHPO,
  Calista Corporation, Maseruliq Incorporated, City of Marshall, and the Native Village of
  Marshall.
- Findings letters went out to the same consulting parties on December 13, 2022.
- A finding of "No Historic Properties Affected" was transmitted by letter to SHPO, and consulting parties on August 26, 2021; the SHPO concurred on December 30, 2021.

### IV. Project Section 4(f) Use Determination

The project work will be limited to existing airport access road and airport property, with no additional ROW access required. The Marshall Airport lies within the Yukon Delta NWR administrative boundaries; however, project work will not convert or work on or within Yukon Delta NWR property. This project would therefore be considered adjacent to the NWR, with no

substantial impairments (noise, esthetics, access, vibration, or ecological intrusions) that would result in a constructive use to the NWR. As a result, there will be no Section 4(f) use of the Yukon Delta NWR by the proposed project.
