

KEYNOTE PRESENTERS



THERESE W. MCMILLAN FTA Deputy Administrator

Therese McMillan was appointed FTA Deputy Administrator on July 2, 2009. Therese assists the Administrator in leading a staff of more than 500 in the Washington D.C. headquarters office and 10 regional offices throughout the United States. Deputy McMillan worked with

FTA staff in allocating \$8.78 billion for 1,072 Recovery Act grants that created or retained over 12,500 jobs and strengthened and enhanced public transportation for working Americans and their communities. Deputy McMillan also leads a special task force on Civil Rights to comply with the increased—and welcome—attention that the Obama Administration and Secretary Ray LaHood have placed on the entire body of Civil Rights responsibilities that the DOT and all federal agencies are expected to carry out on behalf of the American public. Therese also serves on the Partnership for Sustainable Communities with fellow DOT colleagues, EPA and HUD.

Prior to her appointment, Ms. McMillan was the Deputy Executive Director-Policy at the San Francisco Bay Area Region's Metropolitan Transportation Commission. Serving that role for nine years, she was responsible for strategic financial planning and MTC's management of federal, state and regional fund sources for transit, highways, roadways and other modes; state and federal legislative advocacy, and public affairs and community outreach. Ms. McMillan received her B.S. degree in Environmental Policy and Planning Analysis from the University of California, Davis (1981) and a joint M.C.P./M.S. in city planning/civil engineering science (1984) from U.C. Berkeley.

Senator Mark Begich is in his third year representing Alaska in the U.S. Senate, where his primary focus is building a strong Alaska economy. Already in his short time in the Senate, Senator Begich has risen to key positions for Alaska. He was recently named

SENATOR LESIL MCGUIRE (INVITED)

Senator Lesil McGuire was born in Portland, Oregon, before her family moved to Alaska in 1973.[1] She attended Willamette University in Salem, Oregon beginning in 1989,[1] where she majored in both political science and speech.[2] She also served two

years as an intern and press aide for Senator Ted Stevens of Alaska before graduating in 1993 with a Bachelors of Arts degree.[2] After college she attended law school at Willamette University College of Law, graduating with a juris doctorate in 1998.[2] In law school she worked for Willamette Law Review, the school's legal journal.[2] After graduation, she returned to Alaska and clerked briefly for Birch Horton Bittner & Cherot before taking a position as an aide to the Alaska State House Judiciary Committee.

In 2000, at the age of 29, she won election to the Alaska House of Representatives to replace John Cowdery, who was elected to the Alaska State Senate.[2] She served in the House as a moderate Republican until 2006 when she was elected to the Alaska State Senate, continuing to serve as a moderate Republican. She is currently the youngest member of the currently-serving Alaska State Senate. She is also the newest president of PNWER, in addition to her duties with the state. She is also active with CSG, otherwise known as the Council of State Governments, having served as the past chair of the Western Region.



U.S. SENATOR LISA MURKOWSKI

Lisa Murkowski is Alaska's senior senator and the first Alaska-born person to represent the state in Congress. Born in the Southeast Alaska community of Ketchikan, Murkowski grew up in towns across the state, including Anchorage and Fairbanks. After serving in the Alaska state

legislature, Murkowski joined the Senate in 2002. She was re-elected in 2010, after running an historic write-in campaign.

As the top Republican on the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, Murkowski has pursued policies that support an "all-ofthe-above" strategy to improve America's energy security and has been a proponent of regulatory reform and increased domestic mining, including developing the nation's rare earth element resources.

Murkowski is also the ranking Republican on the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee overseeing the budgets of the Interior Department and the Environmental Protection Agency. She also serves on the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee; the Senate Indian Affairs Committee.

Murkowski is married to Verne Martell with whom she has two sons, Nicolas and Matthew. Murkowski has a bachelor's degree in economics from Georgetown University and a law degree from Willamette University.



ANDRA NATIONS Retired Special Educator/ Disability Advocate

Andi Nations worked as the Executive Director of the Statewide Independent Living Council from 2008 through 2011. Andi worked with her council members to advocate for and support the independent living program for

seniors and people with disabilities throughout the state of Alaska. During her work with the SILC, Andi has represented Alaskans with disabilities on the Governor's Coordinated Transportation Task Force, as well as on numerous advocacy and support networks. Prior to her employment with the SILC, Andi worked for twenty-five years as a special education teacher, program coordinator and advocate for students with disabilities. She worked with the independent living program, DVR, and many other community agencies within the Mat-Su Valley to empower young people as they transition from school into lives of their choosing in the adult community.
